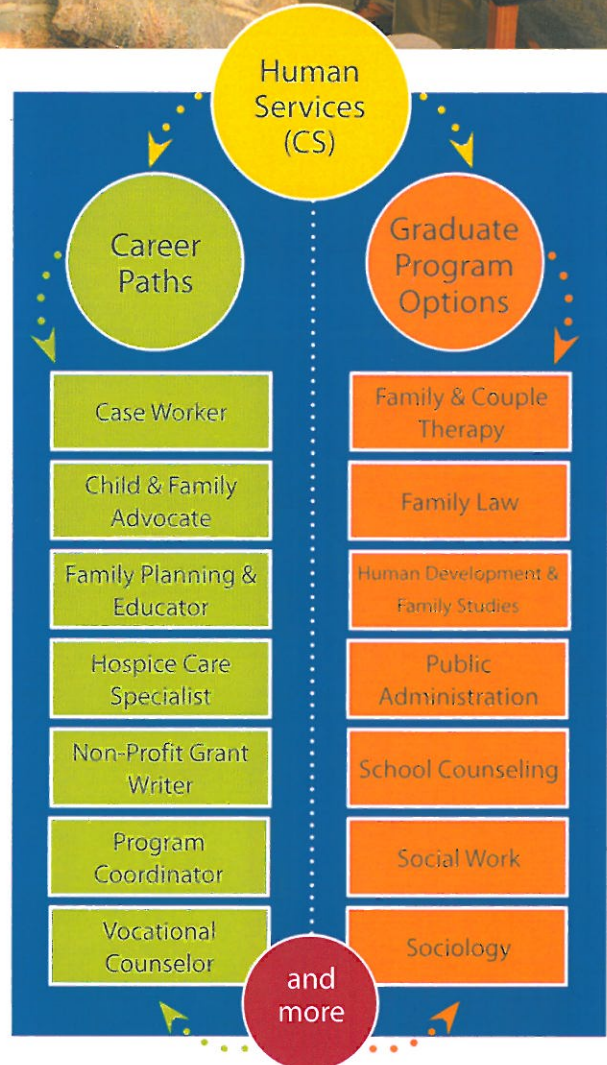




Make a Difference in people's lives

The nationally accredited Human Services major with a concentration in Clinical Services is designed for students wishing to work within public and private agencies serving clients, infants through the elderly, and their families. It is designed for students who want "hands-on" practical experiences in the field culminating in a semester-long internship. Students identify an area of emphasis such as youth development, disabilities, health, juvenile justice, substance abuse prevention, domestic violence prevention or counseling. Combining course work and clinical experiences, the program of study prepares graduates for careers in direct client services and developing quality programs for individuals and families.

Students in the Clinical Services concentration frequently assist faculty with research projects and participate in internships, independent study courses, honor's thesis, study abroad or volunteer and service-learning programs. Graduates become leaders in early education, family support, state and community agencies and the non-profit sector with many students pursuing advanced study in careers addressing the needs of individuals and their families, such as in community and school counseling, social work, and family therapy.

Students seeking academic advisement have access to the Advisement Center--open every weekday. The center, located in the department office, has experienced advisors helping students clarify personal, educational, and professional goals, and assisting students to select the most appropriate academic program.
